WITH A LITTLE HELP FROM HER FRIENDS

Meet an amazing young lady, Jessica, who started as a Main Stay volunteer and is now a Main Stay rider after discovering she had Ewing's Sarcoma, a rare form of cancer that affects the spine. This talented 16 year old has been with the program since she met the volunteer age requirement and it quickly became apparent that Jess was a well-rounded horsewoman capable of sidewalking, grooming, and leading. As a rider herself, competing in jumping and cross country events, she loves being in the barn. She would ask her mom, Cindy, each week if they could leave a little earlier to come to the farm and soon she was out there for five hours every Friday night. As Cindy said, "she couldn't get enough of the place!"

Jess and her family's world changed on December 8, 2010, when after spending months trying to determine why she was having back pain, she was finally diagnosed with cancer. From the beginning, Jess has stated that no matter what happened she wanted to continue to be able to ride. She knew that even if she was permanently paralyzed she still wanted to be with horses. Fellow Friday night teen volunteers and barn friends Grace and Stu jumped at the chance to help make this wish come true for Jess. As soon as she had the strength, Jess was back in the barn at Main Stay – this time riding. She felt a little nervous that first day as a rider, her body had changed so much she wasn't sure how capable she would be. With Stu and Grace by her side offering physical and emotional support, she had a fantastic lesson as fear turned to accomplishment. Jess continues to improve

each time she rides needing only minimal assistance now. Riding has helped her in many ways, both physically and emotionally. One of the most exciting benefits seems to be that Jess's muscles in her legs are stronger and more activated and she is able to flex her right ankle for a period of time after riding. This movement is needed to help her improve her walking and for playing the piano, another one of Jess' loves.



It's been wonderful for both Jess and everyone at the program, especially the Friday night crew, to have her back at the farm. She loves being able to brush Cowboy and be with her barn friends. Jess' mom still gets emotional when she thinks about the support the family has received from their friends, both 2-legged and 4-legged, at Main Stay. Many of the volunteers and staff visited Jess in the hospital and are thrilled to see her progress. Currently, an anonymous donor is paying for Jess's lessons – a generous gift as her medical bills continue to grow as she recently just finished almost a year of chemotherapy treatments. With at least another year of rehab ahead for Jess, we know she'll continue to inspire all of us. Jess's mom summed it up best – "Main Stay is such a good place and a great community".

All of us at Main Stay couldn't agree more and we are honored to be able to teach and learn from everyone who comes through our door.

BY LEARNING YOU WILL TEACH, BY TEACHING YOU WILL LEARN

It was one of those grey days in early spring and I was feeling stuck in disappointment over an unsuccessful attempt to accomplish an educational goal for myself. I kept replaying the experience through my mind--wishing I had done it this way or remembered to have demonstrated that. The constant reel of failure in my mind was unfair and relentless torture. When I arrived at Main Stay, I took a deep breath and cleared my mind so that I could focus on my job and be “present” for my students.

My student had arrived, but she was refusing to get out of the car. I went to see if I could help. In the past when this happened, I had been able to convince her that she

would feel better if she came in to ride. On this drizzly, grey day the task seemed almost insurmountable.

After attempting the normal tactics, she still wouldn't get out of the car and kept repeating, “No, no thank you”! She kept talking about a bad situation that had happened many years before. Her mom shared with me that she often got stuck on past experiences that she perceived as threatening.

I asked her mother to leave us alone in the car. I climbed into the driver's seat and proceeded to talk about how to “let go” of past experiences. I told her that the experience was over and energy spent worrying or feeling angry was useless and unproductive. All of a sudden, it dawned on me that the words I was speaking to her were the words I should have been saying to myself.

I turned to her and thanked her from the bottom of my heart for helping me see exactly what I was trying to teach her! She looked at me with a smile and said, “you're welcome!” She then opened her car door putting on her helmet as she walked to where her horse was waiting. I walked a few steps behind with a slow smile stretching across my lips and it occurred to me, my student had taught me! She helped me see what I was doing to sabotage my own sense of self. I helped her and she helped me.

I became the student that day, with a most important life lesson reviewed and learned. My student and I had created a partnership, not unlike the feeling of partnership that is formed on the back of a horse, a harmony of give and take, one learning from the other. I will never forget the feeling that overcame me that grey afternoon.

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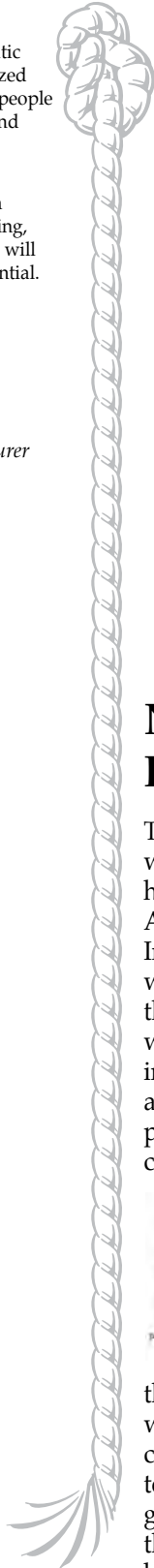
